#### **ABOUT THE SPEAKER:**

**Arnab K. Chatterjee** was born in Calcutta, India, in 1975. After completing a Bachelor of Arts in Chemistry from Northwestern University in 1997, he proceeded on to Caltech in 1998 in the laboratory of Professor Robert H. Grubbs. His doctoral research focused on understanding the selectivity patterns of olefin cross-metathesis reactions using catalytic ruthenium alkylidenes. Upon completion of his doctoral research in September 2002, Arnab joined the Genomics Institute of the Novartis Research Foundation. His work over the last 10+ years has been focused on optimization in several medicinal chemistry projects ranging a variety of therapeutic areas (neuroscience, oncology, respiratory disease, and infectious diseases). He is currently at the newly formed nonprofit California Institute for Biomedical Research (Calibr) where he leads the chemistry efforts.

The California Institute for Biomedical Research (Calibr) is an independent, not for profit organization focused on translational research. Calibr's mission is to discover and develop innovative therapies that address unmet medical needs through partnerships with experts in academia and industry. Scientists at Calibr work across a wide range of disease areas to produce paradigm-changing medicines. Calibr's drug discovery efforts are fueled by world-class technologies. At this ACS-sponsored event, Arnab K. Chatterjee, Ph.D., Director of Medicinal Chemistry at Calibr, will describe how Calibr represents at new paradigm for translational research, and share examples of the innovative research that is being prosecuted at Calibr.



#### THE 18<sup>TH</sup> ANNUAL SAN DIEGO MEDICINAL CHEMISTRY SYMPOSIUM

The 18th Annual San Diego Medicinal Chemistry Symposium took place on July 17th at UC San Diego. Price Center Theatre was filled with attendees that came to hear talks from an outstanding set of speakers. Professor Dale Boger from The Scripps Research Institute started the program discussing his groups re-engineering of Vancomycin to combat resistance based on a detailed understanding of Vancomycin's interactions with its biological target. Dr. Nick Carruthers from Janssen Research & Development L.L.C. shared his groups work on selective Orexin 2 antagonists, from discovery research to clinical proof of concept. Dr Ali Al-Mourabit from the Institute of Chemistry of Natural Products described the discovery and synthesis of natural products having reactivity rectivity that is suggestive of a bioluminescent function. Dr. Scott Hecker from the Medicines Company described the discovery of cyclic boronic Beta-lactamase inhibitors including RPX7009, that are promising next generation antibiotics. Dr. Neal Devaraj from UC San Diego spoke about optimzing the tetrazine Diels-Alder reaction as a bioorthogonal ligation technology with utility in cellular imaging. Dr. Tom Wu from GNF gave the final talk on defining the optimal properties for locally delivered small-molecule immune potentiators that could have utility for protecting against the effects of unknown biological agents. The event was organized by Professor Emmanuel Theodorakis and Jeff Rances from UCSD, as well as David Wallace and Mark Tichenor from the ACS-San Diego Section. The event was free for attendees because of the generous financial support of our sponosors Arena, Celgene, Dart Neuroscience, Medicilon, Takeda, UC San Diego, and Vertex. ACS and UCSD are eager to collaborate on another symposium in July 2016.

#### CHEMISTRY FOR YOU AND YOUR KIDS

#### CANDY CHROMATOGRAPHY!

There are many different ways in which mixtures can be separated. In the activity below, you can separate the substances used to color candy by using chromatography.

#### You will need

Safety glasses - Coated chocolate candy (brown) - Coated peanut butter candy (brown) - Pencil - Cotton swaps Coffee filter (cone type) - Water - Paper or plastic cup (at least 7 oz) - Blunt end scissors

- 1. Use your scissors to cut 3 strips of coffee filter about 10 cm long and about 3 cm wide. Write the name of each candy on a separate strip. The name should be written near one end of the strip.
- Pour about 1/4 cup of water into a cup. Dip one end of a cotton swab into the cup and gently wet one side of one of your candies. Gently rub the candy's wet side onto the filter strip about 2 cm from the end to make a dark dot on the paper. Do not put the used end of the cotton swab back in the water.
- Repeat step 2 for your other two candies and paper strips. Use a clean end of a cotton swab each time. Be sure to make your dot dark, on the opposite end of the strip from the name of the candy, and about 2 cm from that end of the strip.
- Carefully place your strips in the cup of water so that only a small portion of the bottom of each strip touches the surface of the water. Be sure your colored dot is above the surface of the water. Bend the rest of the strip over the rim of the cup to keep the strip in place.
- Observe each strip as the water moves up through the dot. What do you notice happening? Was the brown color on the candies a mixture of other colors? What are these other colors? Compare the colors used in each candy. In what ways are they the same or different?

Check the ingredients listed on the candy wrapper to see whether the colors you see were actually used to color the candies!

### SUMMARY OF SAN DIEGO SECTION EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING MINUTES, JULY 7, 2015

<u>Treasurer's Report</u> – Since last meeting: received \$6,840 from National, covering 75% of Councilor travel expenses; received \$1K MedChem Symposium sponsorship from Celgene with more sponsorships expected; current variance of \$21K is positive to budget but typically expenses are higher in the 2<sup>nd</sup> half of the year; Section currently has \$341K in assets, \$7.4 K increase from last year.

<u>Picnic</u> – Picnic had 124 attending. Special thanks to cooks Jim Shih and Rodney Harris, and to Julann Miller for organizing another tasty dessert contest. Many other volunteers aided in making this another successful event.

50-60 Yr Luncheon – Vi at La Jolla Village hosted a fine luncheon in the same dining room as two years ago; 74 attended, the largest ever. Eight of 14 50-yr and 4 of 5 60-yr honorees attended. Vi hosted it gratis because one of their residents, George Fujimoto, was honored.

<u>MedChem</u> – Registrations running ahead of last year at this point; \$6000 in sponsorship expected; UCSD increased support to \$1000; speakers are all on board. David Wallace asked whether speakers should be taken out for dinner; Tom Beattie said in the past there had been no interest in that by speakers.

<u>August Monthly</u> – Had to be rescheduled to Aug. 26; Arnab Chatterjee - Director of Medicinal Chemistry at Calibr - to be held at Calibr; insurance document sent and catering is arranged. Biotage is a sponsor; Beckman-Coulter is also possible.

<u>Sept Monthly</u> – Talk on biosimilars, at Scintillon, which will sponsor at 6868 Nancy Ridge Rd. No date yet; will be late Sept.

<u>ChemExpo</u> – Oct. 24. Insurance letter sent from ACS; assuming Jackie Trischman will provide one from the Girl Scouts; theme this year is "Chemistry Colors Our World"; could use help recruiting company tables; contact San Diego Science Alliance for help in publicizing event.

<u>Distinguished Scientist Award</u> – In response to a request, 4 nominations were received; committee has reached a consensus and hope to be able to announce it at next ExComm Meeting.

Nov Monthly Seminar - Nothing to report.

 $\overline{\text{Elections}}$  – Jim Shih not present. Jackie Trischman will again handle online voting. Need to print up cards to mail telling members to notify if they want a paper ballot.

<u>YCC Symposium</u> – National asked if we would be willing to organize a YCC Symposium at the Spring National Meeting in SD; YCC local chairs to contact National YCC Chair for further information.

<u>Project Seed</u> – Gulin Erdogan not present but Bill Szabo reports that both USD and TSRI have their programs underway and spent the money; anticipate the students will present their work at a research symposium at the end; look at a way to invite them to present at a Section meeting.

<u>Website Development</u> – Ken Ajayi proposed updating the website to make it more compatible with smart phone displays, providing more summary information on the opening page. He offered to provide a prototype at next ExComm and said he could have changes running by the end of Aug.

<u>Section Outreach</u>— Ben Pratt suggested we should begin Section meetings with plugs promoting our current outreach activities.

Western Regional Meeting – Tom Beattie launched a lengthy discussion on having ExComm decide whether it would sponsor a WRM. He suggested that the best time consistent with National meetings and locations would be to do it in the fall of 2018. Depending on the size and character of the meeting it could be a substantial commitment, especially if we try to match the previous WRMs we sponsored which contributed substantially to Section assets. If so, we should be starting the planning process in earnest this year. He was adamant that we should not continue to "kick the can down the road"— we need to make a decision. It was agreed that the first need is to identify and get commitment from two key individuals – a General Chair and Program Chair – who would define the scope of the meeting and commence recruiting a supporting committee. It was also noted that enlisting these individuals will probably require personal contact and encouragement.

<u>Action</u>: Ben Pratt will issue a general call to members to elicit interest in the project.
